This is hurting the ability of the Pacific Fishery Management Council, the National Marine Fisheries Service, the West Coast States, and the U.S.-Canada Pacific Salmon Commission to make informed management recommendations to the Secretary of Commerce. This request would restore funding levels for West Coast data collection.
